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












FROM THE EDITOR

He stayed for a game of pool and said what a great idea he thinks the Ale Trail is – apparently he only has one local pub where he lives."

CHAMPION BEER OF **BRITAIN 2019**

Over 70 breweries were in the running for CAMRA's Champion Beer of Britain Award, which took place on the opening day of the Great British Beer Festival (6 August).

Judges chose the winning beer based on its appearance, aroma, taste and aftertaste across 10 categories. And the winners are:



Congratulations to Surrey Hills Brewery. Its Shere Drop won 2019's Supreme Champion Gold at CAMRA's Great British Beer Festival.

SUPREME CHAMPION **GOLD**

Shere Drop, Surrey Hills Brewery

Description: The brewer's flagship beer (ABV 4.2%) is pale in colour with a subtle hint of grapefruit and lemon in the aroma. The hop bitterness is complemented by a balanced malt flavour. The beer has a long finish, which is moderately dry.

SUPREME CHAMPION SILVER

Afghan Pale, Grey Trees Brewery

Description: Afghan Pale Ale (ABV 5.4%) is crafted like an American pale ale, using Cascade, Citra and Simcoe hops. The Maris Otter malt provides a light colour and dryness to complement the crisp taste and full aroma of the hops.

SUPREME CHAMPION **BRONZE**

Citra, Oakham Ales

Description: Citra (ABV 4.2%) is light gold in colour, with citrus and tropical hop flavours. No stranger to Awards, Citra achieved Bronze in the 2017 Champion Beer of Britain, Golden Ales.

Local winners in other categories included a Bronze (Mild category) for Maggs' Magnificent Mild (ABV 3.5%), West Berkshire Brewery, described as a traditional rich, dark mild with big hitting Maggs' Magnificent biscuit malt flavours, a light earth hop aroma and a velvety smooth finish.

Call for nominations -**Pub Design Awards!**

Entries are being sought for CAMRA's prestigious Pub Design Awards! Anyone can submit a pub into the competition as long as it has a stunning design to showcase.

The Pub Design Awards, held in conjunction with Historic England, recognise

the highest standards of pub design, in categories ranging from the refurbishment and conservation of existing pubs to the construction of new ones.

Judged by a panel of experts in design and conservation. they showcase the very best architectural projects completed between 1 January, 2018 and 30 June, 2019. This year's categories include:

- Refurbishment Award given for a successful makeover of a pub. Judges are looking for work which reflects the building's individual qualities, rather than something that looks like lots of others.
- Conversion to Pub Use Award given for a project which sees a building designed for some other use converted to a pub. The judges are looking for imagination and flair in the conversion.
- New Build Award given to a completely new pub. Judges are looking for individuality, rather than 'off the peg' design.
- Joe Goodwin Award named after a former CAMRA national chairman, who was a champion of the 'ordinary street-corner local'. The judges are looking for projects which give a new lease of life to the building, however it is done.

Local Publican takes to the screen



Local licensee and top chef Tom Kerridge is calling for ailing pubs to get involved with a new primetime TV Series for BBC 2 which focuses on British pubs under threat.

The series will see Kerridge working with ailing pubs and passionate publicans to help keep their local open.

Kerridge has three pubs in Marlow - The Hand & Flowers, the Coach and the Butcher's Tap. First to open was the Hand & Flowers in 2005 which achieved its first Michelin Star within a year of opening and a second in 2012, making it the first pub to hold two Michelin stars. It was also named the



AA Restaurant of the Year for 2011-12.

The series is being created by Bone Soup Productions, a business established by Kerridge and Award-winning television producer Richard Bowron after they met in 2015 on the set of Bake Off: Crème de la Crème.

Stonegate Pub Co builds estate



The Crown in Egham, just one outlet in Stonegate Pub Co's vast pub estate.

Stonegate Pub Company has agreed to buy pubco Ei Group for £1.27bn, which will see the operator's estate rise by 4,000 sites, making Stonegate the UK's largest pub owner.

The operator, which also owns pub chains Slug & Lettuce, Walkabout and Yates currently has 760 sites, a number it has reached incrementally since buying 333 sites from Mitchells & Butlers almost a decade ago.

COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER TO EMBRACE NEW COMMUNITY HUB

After the 'Last Orders' bell rang for the very last time three years ago at The Swan in Clewer, the 18th Century pub has now reopened to the sound of quite a different bell – Windsor's very own Town Crier. Hear ye, Hear ye!

For locals and regular readers, The Swan Pub in Clewer has been a focus of much attention. And not just because it was part of a national statistic surrounding pub closures, but because it has been a pivotal part in bringing the local community together to regenerate this venerable establishment into a community hub.

Our vision was to restore it as a local pub, a real community hub and as a social enterprise, assisting young people with additional needs.

This demanded significant work, however, funded by the local community.



And the great news? The pub opened for business on Saturday, 20 July. The Windsor Town Cryer made the official announcement booming it across the courtyard and adjacent Mill Lane too.

THE SWAN IN ACTION

Opening hours

Until late August the pub will be operating from a temporary bar with seating predominantly in the courtyard. All food and drink will – of course – be properly stored and served at the correct temperature.

- Mon-Fri: 6pm dusk
- Weekends: 11am 10pm

What's on offer?

During opening weeks: a range of beers, spirits, juices and mixers (encouraging feedback from customers)
On tap: a range of Windsor & Eton ales and a lager. Cider on tap plus potentially a guest ale or lager too.

Wine: based on feedback pre-opening, the community gave a resounding "we want good wine please". As a result the team has been building a good quality wine list.

There is still much work to do. We do hope you will come down on a regular basis and see the progress we are making. In line with our vision from the outset, from this autumn we will have a fully functioning and cosy - if a little rustic - pub, proudly serving the community of Clewer and beyond.







However, to get us to this point, there is much renovation work still to be done.

We took the decision to open ASAP in order to give investors and, indeed, all of our customers, the opportunity to sample the atmosphere of The Swan and quench their thirst during the summer months. The renovation work will still progress as The Swan continues on its journey to becoming a fully-fledged pub.



Hundreds attended the Opening Weekend. We had a lucky break with the weather that unexpectedly cleared up for us. It was a really busy day!

This included:

- Setting up the temporary bar.
- Putting a door on the ladies!
- Welcoming the Windsor & Eton Dray as it delivered ceremonial beer barrels.
- Unveiling of the new pub sign
- Greeting the Windsor Town Cryer (who recited a very funny poem about drinking)
- Overseeing excellent food from the Italian Street Food van
- Singing and dancing into the night
- Oh ...and some drinking was done too





























WHEN WILL SLOUGH, WINDSOR & MAIDENHEAD GET ITS FIRST MICRO PUB?



Just Beer, Newark

For anyone not conversant with the concept, a Micro Pub is a small venue selling great cask conditioned beer without a juke box, large screen television, gaming machine etc but with the added bonus of a quiet pint and good conversation.

Often opening what now seem restricted hours (but in reality the times most people want to go to the pub) it does not fall into the trap of trying to satisfy the needs of all its customers but failing spectacularly and satisfying no-one. Its target market is those people who want to enjoy great cask conditioned ale and this is its unique niche as other types of cold, fizzy beers can be obtained at a third of the price from one of the big four supermarkets.

The Micro Pub movement can be traced back just over a decade to the opening of The Butchers Arms in Herne Bay, Kent by Martyn Hillier who converted a former butcher's shop (hence the name) into a cosy venue for the enjoyment of great beer. Whereas 30 years ago the retail drinks industry was dominated by the big six brewers, the powerbase has changed such that now the large supermarket chains and pub companies dominate.

The 2003 Licensing Act eased restrictions on the granting of pub licences and thus, in November 2005, the first Micro Pub opened, taking a lead from the Micro breweries that were springing up around the country. It offered an outlet which was intimate and did not demand the need for 500 barrel runs of the same beer or huge discounts in order to be stocked.

There are now over 200 Micro Pubs in the country. Berkshire, however, currently has just one, the Cow & Cask in Market Street, Newbury, whereas Kent, the home of the Micro Pub, has over 20 and the town of Dover has no less than four!

The premises used are traditionally not former pubs but may have been shops or offices in a former existence (echoes of the Wetherspoons business model in converting cinemas, banks, churches etc) with basic furnishings and none of the trappings of most modern pubs. It must be remembered however that they are a commercial venture and at least one person's livelihood depends on its success, therefore it is not sufficient to visit once a year at Christmas for half a shandy. Its survival depends on a regular turnover of quality beers giving good choice with lower than normal overheads.

One reason that there may be so few local Micro Pubs may be linked to the exorbitant property prices in Berkshire, Having said that, even London now has more than half a dozen Micro Pubs. With the growth of local breweries it would be a welcome addition to the local real ale scene and I believe would also help stem the tide of pub closures.

Our chosen charity, Thames Hospice, signed up new lottery ticket members and rattled their buckets, they have now confirmed that £928.65 was raised throughout the festival, fantastic with a special mention to Tommy and his games team and Lorraine, my better half, who hassled drinkers on the way out to donate their unused beer tokens to the Hospice.

Finally, a big thank you go tour Sponsors without whom we would find it difficult to provide the entertainment which we know goes down so well and, just as important, another big thank you to the CAMRA volunteers who served the beer, kept the site clean, secure and safe. Without them the festival would not exist.





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

WINDSOR PROVES A HOPPY PLACE

Friday August 9 saw the opening of A Hoppy Place, a family run, craft beer establishment which aims to present the most exciting local beers, along with international craft beer, wine and spirits. Co-owner Dave Heyward explains.

What is so exciting about opening up is the astounding selection of fabulous local brewers in our area.

We aim to bring the absolute best of the fantastic local beer market to the masses, as well as key guest beers from the craft community worldwide. No mainstream brews here, we are all about finding and championing the absolute best there is to offer from the craft sector.



Craft is a bit of a buzzword at the moment, and your description may vary. For what it's worth, we consider craft to be majority independent, family owned, and wherever possible not tied to the behemoths that are Miller Coors, AB InBev, Heineken or Diageo. We particularly champion beer, wines and spirits from our own home counties and the Royal Borough, but that won't stop us ruling out an excellent brew from further afield. If Sierra create a fantastic special release Barley wine, we'll stock it if we can.



Fifteen years ago our most widely drunk local brewery would probably have been Brakspear in Henley on Thames. But the vast majority of local pubs would have given you the same thing. Foster's or Carling.

We are privileged to be opening at a time when there are literally 200 breweries that could offer us direct distribution. It makes for a new challenge on the brewing side; Craft Beer is here to stay and the Taproom model is growing, but just how do you carve out a niche as a craft brewer when in the arch next door is another one?

Well for me it's simple. Craft is nowhere near its peak. The guys on the Bermondsey Beer Mile don't groan when another local brewer (though I wonder how they feel when nationwide breweries try to muscle in) opens up. They know the footfall warrants it. And so I feel when another brewery opens within range of our shop, I'm delighted on two fronts: firstly, we aren't brewing so don't feel the pinch of increased competition, but secondly, in a market that's still tiny in the grand scheme with around 80% of beer sales going to mass produced lager beers, every bit of differentiation is another opportunity to convert. To champion our craft beer revolution.





That's why I got so excited when planning our opening beer choices. I got to talk to all of these guys, to select from the very best of local beer, and to put together a beer menu that will excite our patrons and lift the veil on what I think are some of East Berkshire and beyond's best kept secrets. To have all of these fantastic breweries within 20 miles is for us simply fantastic. Cheers!



NEW BEER GARDEN AT MOOGBREW

PUB SIGNS

A UNIQUE ART FORM

Anyone who passes a pub will often see a unique art form in the shape of a painted sign board advertising the name of the pub and often the brewery if it is a tied house. These signs are the descendants of the Roman tradition of hanging a bush outside of a house where drink and food could be obtained (hence the popular pub name "The Bush") or a chequer board showing that games were played within (hence the pub name "The Chequers").

The pub sign painter's art is to capture the essence of the pub and this was important in the days when literacy rates were low but everyone could recognise the picture and know what was the name of the pub. It gave

the painter some leeway in the design of each sign and breweries would employ specialist painters to create each new sign and to refurbish older signage.

The sign would be painted in very high quality paint as it was expected to stand up to all weathers and would have a lifespan of around 10 years but modern technology has been used in some signs to create plastic relief signage which it was felt would last longer. The artist would often double up as the sign writer and for a very classy sign may actually use gold leaf



to ensure the lettering remained perfect for as long as possible.

The pub sign painter gets little recognition but their works



may be seen by many more people than a picture in an art gallery. One of the most famous painters of pub signs was George Mackenney who had studied at the Westham School of Art before undertaking a number of commissions after his wife contacted breweries to ask for work. In his career he painted over 6,000 signs which considering a sign is double

The Red Lion, Wokingham considering a sign is double sided meant 12,000 pictures! It is no wonder that when working he spent around 14 hours a day in the studio and rarely took a holiday.

Some signs would use humour and many people will remember the sign at the "Whod a tho't it" in Crowthorne with an astronaut on the moon being confronted with a bottle of Morlands beer!. Another sign using humour is "The world turned upside down" in Reading (now

THE WORLD TURNED UPSIDE DOWN

Reading (now converted to a carvery) where events

are not what one would expect!

A similar named pub in Southwark (now closed) used a theme of fishing to give a very funny interpretation of the name.

It is a sad fact that economics has forced many pubs to abandon a

painted pictorial sign and instead use a mere name board in its place. The Golden Farmer in Bracknell used to have a picture of William Davis, the infamous highwayman and "golden farmer" to adorn the premises but this has been replaced with a rather boring name board.

A very special signage is that of the gallows sign that spans the whole road. The Swan in Fittleworth, West Sussex has one of the most famous of these signs and there is no missing it for a weary traveller.

Pub signs are a very unique and British art form and breweries and pub companies should be encouraged to keep this piece of pub tradition alive and not to revert to mere name boards or plastic signage.
